- 4. Make a flashcard for each quotation.
- 5. Colour code quotations to organise them into characters, themes or Acts.
- 6. Turn your quotes into quizzes. Try testing friends or relatives!
- 7. Unpick and analyse key words and techniques.
- 8. Link quotes to context and/or themes.
- 9. Consider creative methods for learning quotations by changing them into songs or raps.
- 10. Create little rhymes and mnemonics to help memorise quotations.
